Diocesan Report 1892. The children passed a very satisfactory Examination, their answers showing careful, capable teaching. The Infant Class as usual is very bright and promising.

November 1892. 25 to 30 children absent each day due to prevalence of whooping cough. Poor attendance carries on through illness through January 1893.

1893 Government Report. Quote "A suitable blackboard and easel are required in the Infants' Class."

6 July 1893. School Holiday (Royal Marriage).

14 July 1893. A great number of children absent the past week pulling peas.

1894 March 1894. School closed for 3 weeks owing to measles.

Government Report. Quote "It however seems somewhat doubtful that Arithmetic has been properly taught when a ball frame or any equivalent device has not been deemed a necessary part of the apparatus in the Infants' room."

May 1894. A ball frame bought. Yearly average attendance 81.2. The Attendance Officer called. Reported several cases including 2 boys illegally employed.

1895 Yearly average attendance 91.

1896 Yearly average attendance 94.2.

2 March 1896. Commencement of School year. Number on register 110.

3 July 1896. Several children absent illegally employed in the fields. Cases reported to the Attendance Officer.

1897 25 June 1897. The School was closed Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday as the room was required for the Diamond Jubilee festivities. Yearly average attendance 97.

1898 Government Report - April 1898. Quote "Infants' Class. The children are in very good order and are carefully taught. The lower fixed grant can only be awarded to the Infants' Class as their teacher is also employed in teaching Needlework to the older girls."
