

- 1908 1908. 21 children have made full attendance during the past year.
- 7 May 1908. Football match arranged between Naburn and Escrick School.
- 25 May 1908. Empire Day celebrated here today. In the afternoon an address on the Empire and the Flag was given to Standards II-VII. The Union Jack was hoisted and the children marched to the maypole and sang the National Anthem and "Flag of Britain". They then each saluted the flag as they marched by.
- July 1908. During the last two months, 6 cricket matches have been played by the School team with neighbouring clubs. Four matches have been won and two lost.
- 1909 1909. A piano has been placed in the School.
- 1910 4 May 1910. According to a letter from the Board of Education, the accommodation of this School has been reduced and is now on the 10 sq.ft. basis for older scholars and 9 sq.ft. for infants. The accommodation is therefore as follows:-

- 15 September 1910. Mr. and Mrs. Wilson cease their connection with the School.
- 19 September 1910. Mr. H. Calvert took charge of the School. Miss Burns commenced duty as Infants' teacher.
- 2 December 1910. Several children left during the past week reducing the number to 65.
- 1911 13 April 1911. 4 children left school, brings number down to 61.
- 11 September 1911. New offices have been built for use of the children. The old offices have been converted into a coalhouse and a storehouse. The boys' cloakroom has been enlarged.
- 1912 14 October 1912. Number of books now 76.
- 1913 H.M.I. Report on Premises June 1913. The ventilation in the Infants' Classroom is inadequate on warm days. The gallery in the Infants' Room is of an inconvenient type and should be replaced by more suitable furniture.
1913. For the third time in succession the School has secured the 1st prize in the class for Village Schools at the Yorkshire Choral Competition. Quote from the "Yorkshire Evening Press" "Naburn had sung the test piece in very good time and the tone was quite beautiful at times".
- 1914 20 January 1914. Out of 82 on the books only 39 are present this afternoon owing to measles, colds, etc.
- 21 January 1914. School closed for 3 weeks by order of the M.o.H.
